Spiritual Disciplines Within The Church Chapter 1: Why Go to Church?

"I was glad when they said to me, 'Let us go unto the house of the Lord.'" (Ps. 122:1)

Introduction:

Why should I read anything about going to church?

- God has spoken in the Bible about going to church.
- Those of us who attend church need to <u>evaluate</u> our reasons and make sure that our basis for going is not <u>habit</u> alone.
- You may not need persuading, but the information in this book can be useful in talking to your children.
- Anyone who claims to follow Christ needs to be <u>challenged</u> with what the <u>Bible</u> says about going to church.
- Even though you may have been faithful in church for a long time, you are no longer sure about continuing.

The following are just a few reasons of why people do not attend church:

- Turned off by what seems an endless asking for money.
- Services bore them.
- The sermons are irrelevant to their lives.
- When they do attend, they leave feeling guilty.
- Sunday is the only day off.
- They must work on Sunday.
- They had a bad experience.
- They have not been invited.
- They would feel uncomfortable going alone.
- Think their lifestyle is too unacceptable to the expectations of churchgoers.
- They are convinced church has nothing to offer them.
- There isn't time.
- Going to church is a Biblical requirement for all Christians.

A recent survey of a cross section of Americans shows that almost half agree that "the Bible does not command people to attend a church; that is a man-made requirement." In fact, the Bible is very plain: "And let us consider one another to provoke unto love and to good works: Not forsaking the assembling of ourselves together, as the manner of some is; but exhorting one another: and so much the more, as ye see the day approaching." (Heb. 10:24-25) This command was not given whimsically. The church is not a department store where you come and get the spiritual commodity you want, then go your way. To speak of loving Christ while neglecting His body, the church, is hypocritical. (Eph. 1:23; 4:12, 15-16; 5:29-30)

Benefits

I. Going to church helps prevent backsliding and apostasy.

- A. Spiritual <u>erosion</u> was taking place within those who had gotten into the habit of neglecting the meetings of church. (Heb. 10:25)
 - "Statistics show that if you don't go to church for a month, the odds are almost two-to-one that you won't go for more than a year."
- B. If you can <u>miss</u> church and not *miss* church, then something is <u>absent</u> from your heart and faith.

II. Going to church brings spiritual fellowship and encouragement.

- A. One of the four main characteristics of the church's gatherings was "fellowship. (Acts 2:42)
 - 1. No Christian can thrive without the two spiritual nutrients: fellowship and encouragement. (Heb. 10:25)
 - 2. Only Christians can fellowship, at least in the Biblical sense.
- B. The church provides ways in which to receive encouragement:
 - 1. Preaching and teaching of God's Word. (Rom. 15:4-5)
 - 2. Perseverance of other believers.
 - 3. The example of more mature believers.
 - 4. Church members who struggle <u>successfully</u> with some of the same daily issues we face.
 - 5. Praying and singing praises of God and others.

"If a child is going to be emotionally healthy, he needs the socialization and encouragement a family can provide. In the same way, every child of God needs the fellowship and encouragement that God intends for him to receive from a church family if he is going to be spiritually healthy."

III. Going to church expresses obedience to the greatest commandment. (Mark 12:28-30)

- A. Is God your greatest love and highest priority?
- B. We should go to church because we love God more than anyone else.

IV. Going to church follows Jesus' example. (Luke 4:16)

- A. "And as His custom was, He went into the synagogue on the Sabbath day. . ."
- B. Jesus had spiritual and eternal reasons He could have given for not having time for corporate worship.

V. Going to church is a <u>testimony</u> of support for God's work in the world. (Matthew 12:30)

- A. Gathering or scattering?
- B. Do people see what is important to you?

VI. Going to church enables you to hear in person the preaching of God's Word.

- A. God has <u>ordained</u> preaching. (II Tim. 4:2-4)
- B. No Christian should substitute a media ministry for attending a local church.
 - 1. In media preaching you have the ability to turn it off. (II Tim. 4:3)
 - 2. The sense of immediacy is absent in media preaching.
 - 3. It fosters inevitable individualization.

"Watching church instead of attending tends not only to breed disloyalty to the church but to foster an isolated, private, and individualistic kind of Christianity; and that is not the kinds of Christianity nourished in the Bible."

VII. Going to church allows you to take the Lord's Supper. (I Cor. 11:26)

VIII. Going to church enables you to experience special blessings from God.

- A. There are <u>blessings</u> the Father gives only in the context of public worship. (I Cor. 14:26, 31)
- B. God blesses us with <u>strength</u>, instruction, and <u>encouragement</u> when we come together at church to worship Him.

IX. Going to church helps prevent an unbalanced Christian life.

- A. Christians who do not attend church are usually the most unbalanced Christians.
- B. God gives gifted individuals to the church to equip and strengthen her. (Eph. 4:11-16)

X. Going to church is one indication of eternal life.

- A. Church attendance is no proof that a person has eternal life. (Jn. 3:14)
- B. Those who "have passed from death to life" are <u>compelled</u> by a oneness with others who have eternal life.

XI. Not going to church is one indication of NOT being in God's family.

"Anyone who, without <u>regret</u>, is persistently willing to disobey the Lord's command to meet with the people of God when they gather for public worship, and who is <u>willing</u> to forsake all the privileges and blessings God provides through the local church, may have some "religion", but he or she does not have <u>biblical</u> Christianity."

- A. Going to church does not make you a Christian.
- B. Going to church is vital for Christians.
- C. Not going to church is self-centered and foolish.
- D. Not going to church is willful disobedience to the authority of God.
- E. No church will be perfect or free from offensive things.
